

George Orwell's last books, 1984 and Animal Farm, are known around the world. Less well-known are his essays, set out in a distinctive style that is "clear as a windowpane," to use Orwell's phrase. A master of the essay, Orwell combined sharp observations of the world around him with reflections on politics, and people.

We will read and discuss several of Orwell's essays including *Politics and the English Language*, in which Orwell discusses the degradation of truth in an era of alternative facts. Other essays to be discussed include his classic memoirs of working as an Imperial Police Officer in Burma, *Shooting an Elephant*; of *Looking Back on the Spanish Civil War*; and of his schooldays, *Such, Such Were the Joys*.
